Advent Reflection

Did you ever have the feeling on Christmas day that somehow; even with all the preparation – cookies and baking, shopping and wrapping gifts, cleaning and decorating – you missed Christmas? Well, you are not alone. Would you like to have a deep and long lasting Christmas experience? Then we need to delve into Advent. Advent is the beginning of the church year and a time to help us get ready to be citizens of the Kingdom of God.

During Advent we hear from the prophet Isaiah as he describes the kingdom of God 700 years before the birth of Christ. It was the promise that would become reality when the Messiah came. So what happened? Jesus the Savior was born as promised, preached the Kingdom, died for our sins, rose again, putting an end to death itself and now sits at the right hand of the Father in glory. Why can't we see it? Why can't we find it? The answer, which I suspect you already know, is that the kingdom is a matter of the heart.

This year, let's use Advent to become a "fellow citizen with the holy ones" of the Kingdom. I invite you to create an Advent wreath in your heart, each week light an inner candle so that when Christmas arrives you

There is a different message each week of Advent helping us make the vision a reality.

Advent 2010 Meditations.....

First Week of Advent - November 28th
Stay Awake or Be Aware - Let the first candle in the
Advent wreath shine a light on the dark places of
our hearts, the places that are the source of our
struggles and keep us from being members of God's
household.

Second Week of Advent - December 5th Repent, the Kingdom of God is at hand. There are two candles now, shedding more light; showing us the way to repent, to make a change.

Third Week of Advent - December 12th
Rejoice! Be Strong, Fear Not, do not lose
heart. Three candles show us that the goal is in
sight. Did you know that the words "do not be
afraid" occur 365 times in scripture?

Fourth Week of Advent -December 19th
We hear how completely Mary and Joseph trusted
God and the result -Emmanuel - God is with
us. Four candles are lit now; we have travelled from
darkness to light. We are ready for our own "Silent
Night" - the wonder, peace, joy of that moment
when God himself is born in our hearts.
